Reconnecting in a Lonely World

Ross Douthat of "The New York Times" writes about it and the Beatles sang about it: loneliness. "People become more likely to do



damage to themselves and others when they get disconnected from society's core institutions (e.g., marriage, religion) or when their economic prospects take a dive (e.g., unemployment)," writes Mr. Douthat. He goes on: "In an essay for 'The New

Republic,' about the consequences of loneliness for public health, Judith Shulevitz reports that one in three Americans over 45 identifies as chronically lonely, up from just one in five a decade ago. With baby boomers reaching retirement age at a rate of 10,000 a day, the number of lonely Americans will surely spike."

"All the lonely people," the Beatles sang in the late 1960s, "where do they all come from? Eleanor Rigby picks up the rice in the church where a wedding has been, lives in a dream. Waits at the window, wearing the face that she keeps in a jar by the door, who is it for? All the lonely people, where do they all come from? All the lonely people, where do they all belong?"

Douthat writes that there are ways to manage this "loneliness epidemic." "Social workers, therapists, pets, and, of course, the Internet, all promise endless forms of belonging and community for the lonely. But all of these options seem destined to leave certain basic human yearnings unaddressed. For many people, the strongest forms of community are still the traditional ones -- the kind forged by shared genes, shared stories, shared geography, shared faith. And neither Facebook nor a life coach nor a well-meaning bureaucracy is likely to compensate for these forms' attenuation and decline."


Faith and Literature Moves to 11:00 in the Coke Activities Room



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



Mission Outreach Rosebud Mission Work Brings Joy and Fulfillment

Nine Saint Michael missionaries completed a week of hard work at Rosebud tired, but fulfilled by what they accomplished.



During their week at the Sioux Indian reservation in South Dakota they replaced one-half of the roof on the Saint Thomas Episcopal Church, including replacing the church's bell, which Kevin Huddleston swears weight at least four tons. The group also conducted Vacation Bible School, provided fluoride treatments to 30 children from the reservation, and cooked and served dinner for approximately 80 residents in the Black Pipe community.

For several years, Saint Michael and All Angels has conducted mission trips to the Rosebud reservation, which is among the poorest communities in America.

Honduras Threads Seeks to Bolster Economic Status of Women in Rural Communities

For several years, parishioners from Saint Michael and All Angels have been traveling to rural communities in Honduras working to improve the economic status of women and their families. The Honduras Threads mission trip with ten parishioners left on Sunday, June 30 and will spend the week in Tegucigalpa and four nearby towns to continue that work.

With the help of Saint Michael missionaries the women have formed coops sewing pillows, table



cloths, and other fabric products for sale in the United States and other markets in Honduras. Honduras Threads is a micro-enterprise that provides seed-capital and training to women to start self-sustaining businesses. On previous missions the group has focused

on product design and efficient production methods, marketing, and accounting and computer skills.

Pastoral Care:

Letters, We Get Letters...

Annette Lentz, leader of the Christian Yoga classes at Saint Michael, shares some letters that class members have sent her lauding the benefits they have received from participation in the classes.

When I first started going to Christian Yoga I wasn't sure if I would like it or be able to do it! I really don't like stretching (even though it's probably the most important thing to do) and I'm not very good at being "still".

But now I LOVE it and look forward to your class every Monday. I have the normal aches and pains associated with getting older. I have found yoga to be quite beneficial in keeping all that in check.

I also really appreciate all the different readings you do at the beginning and end of class. They really help us get centered —Marcie

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Yoga is the fountain of youth!. I see it in others, and I feel it in myself. I sleep better on Monday nights if I have done your class, Annette. Yoga also relieves the chronic back, neck and shoulder pain I experience from many hours of working on the computer. —Gayla.

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Annette, I loved class last night and want to thank you for all you do to promote health and well-being at Saint Michael's. Other than the feel good merits, I want you to know that I've had some medical benefits as well.

I have two medical problems that seem to have been mitigated by yoga. The first thing I noticed was the pain in my right knee disappeared. I had an MRI on this knee two years ago and was told I have osteoarthritis. The orthopedist recommended physical therapy and explained that to avoid surgery, I needed to strengthen the muscles around the knee. My internist suggested I might also try yoga. So, when I heard about your class, I decided to try yoga first. Two years later, I rarely think about my knee, which used to constantly remind me it was in pain.

And, I have had osteopenia in my spine (in the neck). I have yearly bone density tests and the trouble spots have remained consistent, with one part of my neck becoming increasingly more porous. I switched from calcium to Vitamin D about two years ago and at the same time started yoga. Last year's bone density results were about the same as the year before. But, last week, to my surprise, my internist said "whatever you are doing, keep it up. Your neck bone density is in the normal range." I'm thrilled about the spine results.

The other thing the doctor recommended to prevent osteoporosis is twenty minutes a day of sunshine. I don't have to go outside on Mondays. I get to be with you at Yoga. You are my sunshine! — Stephanie

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Annette Lentz agreed that "one of the most powerful parts of the time spent together, in addition to the health benefits, is the community building that yoga is offering us as we spend time in silence and relaxation at the end of our sessions. There is just something soothing about being at church, lying on the floor and being given permission to go inward, letting all thoughts be put aside for just a few minutes. Many of those attending say that they feel rejuvenated at the end of class and sleep better that night."

We don't promise to cure you of all your ills, but we do promise you will feel more relaxed by the end of a session.

Annette reminds us that there is no pressure to do what one is uncomfortable doing. Beginners are welcome and encouraged to go at a slow pace and rest anytime. Consider joining the Monday night Christian Yoga classes. Contact Annette Lentz, annette.lentz@abcglobal. net

Courtyard Columbarium Construction on Schedule

Also, work will begin this month on refurbishment of the original columbarium.



Reconnecting

Kurt Vonnegut once asked: "What should young people do with their lives today? Many things, obviously. But the most daring thing is to create personal, stable communities in which the terrible disease of loneliness can be cured." We at Saint Michael and All Angels agree! In fact, that is the very nature and purpose of a parish community. A parish is the place where people from disparate backgrounds come together to be a faith community -- in corporate worship, where we serve together in the shadow of the cross and in the light of Easter morning. It's the place where we are brought when we are born and where we are brought when we die -- and where, in the time between, we gather over and over with our friends -- new and old -- with our sisters and brothers in Christ, to celebrate our very life itself. For all its imperfections, for all its foibles and incompleteness, and, yes, sometimes silliness, the parish community is the closest we come in imitating Christ and the Kingdom of God.

That's why Saint Michael, for all its growth and maturity as a community of faith, feels most like itself when things go well and when little things go wrong. In a good novel, D.H. Lawrence once observed, there is always a banana peel on the premises. So, too, with a good church. Grace and growth and belonging come through a willingness to be vulnerable and transparent, a willingness to risk and try and fail and then start afresh. I hope our children know that about our faith journey -- that it is solemn, but its also fun, sometimes even funny. Like when on Palm Sunday the donkey dropped what donkeys drop in the grass. Or, the older lady who was a good sport several years ago when the Easter vigil candle momentarily ignited her wellcoiffed hair. Or, the infamous story of the Thurifer who caught the old peach carpet on fire. Or, the little boy who stopped me cold during a dialogue children's sermon in the Discovery Mass: "The answer is 'Jesus.' The answer to all your questions is always 'Jesus.' "

During this summer when we have the chance for rest, renewal and reconnection, I invite us to consider the wonderful gift of our parish community. So herewith some suggestions for summer recreation and reconnection:

- + Reconnect with family and close friends. Summer is a great excuse to take time for others. Sometimes neutral ground helps. A quiet hike, a talk away from the picnic table, or just a fishing buddy by a good trout stream.
- + Restore lost patterns. Get a good night's sleep. Take time to eat real food. Sit still for, say, fifteen minutes and meditate.
- + Read. If you routinely wish you could get to a book and you fall asleep after a few pages, this summer could be your book alert. Try on that meaty, narrative book that deserves to be read ... I suggest Jon Meacham or Doris Kearns Goodwin... or, how about a significant portion of the Bible. Yes, you would expect me to throw that in.
- + Church attendance. If you've been a "church rat," hanging around Saint Michael all the time, then take a short vacation from churchgoing. And to those who have long-running excuses for staying away, surprise yourself. Go.

See you in church where belonging and connection trump loneliness and isolation. It's good for the soul.
