Epiphany: Practicing an Incarnation for the World

Will they sleep through the night? Will they make good grades? Will they make the travel team? Will they avoid the pitfalls of early sex and

> the ravages of drugs? Will they get into a descent school?

> These are just some of the questions that parents ask themselves as their children grow up and move on. But there are

overriding questions that parents constantly ask themselves: Will they be good, will they have compassionate character, will they treat others with respect, will their life count when the moral meter is brought to bear? These are the ageless questions for all ages, as old as the Bible, which differentiates between "children of light" and "children of darkness." Yet it seems particularly important today, when second-grade boys in Oregon try to suffocate a girl, when Nigerian children without shoes carry their own AK-47s, when teenagers ravage elementary schools with an arsenal of weapons that make some smalltown police forces look benign.

Ralph Waldo Emerson once said, "Character is higher than intellect." Jesus said it better, "Love one another as I have loved you. No one has greater love than this, to lay down one's life for one's friends. You are my friends ... I do not call you servants any longer, because the servant does not know what the master is doing; but I have called you friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have from God."

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Clergy Transitions

A Message From the Rector

I consider myself blessed because I like my vocation as a priest even more today than when I began. Parish life is immensely rewarding partly because of the very talented and faithful associate clergy with whom I share ministry.



It is with very mixed emotions that I share the news that The Rev. Brenda Sol will be completing the Lilly Fellowship program this spring and will be leaving us for another ministry. While she loves her work here, and while I encouraged her to stay beyond the granting season, she feels called to

pursue another ministry, likely on the West Coast, beginning this summer. During the coming months she will be meeting with parish call committees and tending to transitions of ministries at Saint Michael.

When The Rev. Greg Pickens joined our staff two years ago as Associate for Children, Youth and Families, we were enthusiastic about him assuming this important role -- with

a very talented staff and lay leadership in that area -- and we also thought that at some time in the not-too-distant future, we could ask him to work in a proven area of strength: operations. When Rusty Smith stepped down from being the Director of Operations three years ago, we decided to



continue his good work with area directors (Rob Baber in finance, Kimberly Robinson in parish administration and Bracken Reece with facilities) until such time as we had the right person to assume the overall leadership. Greg Pickens is the right person. Beginning February 1, The Rev. Mr. Pickens began a new post on our clergy team: Associate for Operations. When Brenda departs, I've asked Greg to also be connected to several pastoral care groupings. This will not change Lisa Flores' ministry: she remains as the principle priest in that area.

During the past several months, we have fashioned a ministry description for a new priest to join our staff this summer. For some period I have had in mind a priest who has seasoned abilities in the whole range of preaching, formation and writing and yet is still on the younger side of a ministry career. I have a decided preference for candidates 40 and under, likely married with young children. I have chosen to use the title "Vicar" for this new post, to indicate her/his intended leadership place in our community. This doesn't shift any of the other clergy from their principle leadership positions in their areas, and all of the associate clergy have a direct connection with me. In short, this title is NOT a renaming of a former ministry position here: Vice-Rector. But it does say to us that this new priest carries some responsibilities in our overall vision and execution that warrants this new title. During the next month we have a final candidate coming to look at this ministry position with us. I hope to be able to tell you more by the middle of the spring.

The Gathering in the *Dallas Morning News*



The Gathering, a church for the homeless in downtown Dallas which was launched by Saint Michael deacon Jim Webb, was the front page story in the *Dallas Morning News Neighborsgo* edition Friday, January 10.

The writer, Taylor Danser, in the article titled 'Coming Together – Downtown church a home for those without one" started her story saying, "Once a week, drawn by word of mouth, homeless people from across Dallas congregate at a downtown Dallas landmark – Thanks-giving Square – to worship together...The Gathering, which is supported by the Episcopal Diocese of Dallas, provides the church service and lunch."



Ms. Danser's article said The Gathering serves about 100 homeless people every Sunday. She quoted Jim Webb as saying that other church services reach out to the homeless, but that The Gathering's effort is a "little different." Webb said, "There are some that are more fundamental and evangelical. Our goal is to build community, to inspire hope, and to have them feel God's love."

Commenting on the newspaper article Webb said, "The Gathering would not have been so successful without the support and help of clergy, staff and laity of Saint Michael. Bob Dannals gave seed funds and has allowed us to print numerous items. Andy Sahl's youth group provided food, socks, and water. Kevin Huddleston and Brenda Sol were some of the




first celebrants. Kathy O'Doherty, one of the three founders, is the operations support, and she initiated the altar guild and chalice bear group for the church. Rusty Taco (owned by parishioners) provided food for the first three months at cost until we could start a rotation of other churches. Bill McGannon is now chairman of the Friends of The Gathering. Ariail Gores is soliciting the support of other churches to provide meals, while Saint Michael, coordinated by Mary Ruth and Steve McKenney, provides the meal every other month."

The newspaper story quoted several homeless church attendees. Darren Lewis said, "My faith has its ups and downs. Coming here helps that, especially with some of the conditions I'm living in." Alonzo Bay told the reporter, "I go to this church more than any other church. It's easy to get to, and it's a lot better...This is more like a family."

Ms. Danser closed the article quoting Deacon Webb, "We're not trying to be a social service. But, sometimes we just happen to be in a spot, and we're able to help them somehow."

This month's mission trip to Tela, Honduras departs on Saturday, March 8 led by Saint Michael Rector, Bob Dannals. 23 parishioners are taking part in the week-long trip which will take them into many of the small burros surrounding Tela.

The missionaries will conduct Christian education for students in several communities, will give dental fluoride treatments to children, and will perform painting and restoration work at the Episcopal church and school in Tela.

Christmas Giving Nears \$88,000 All Goes to Outreach

Offerings from Christmas Eve, Christmas Day, and the Heart of Giving program totaled \$87,722, all of which will go to Saint Michael outreach ministries.

The Christmas offerings of \$54,777 will be divided equally for children's programs at the American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem, the Rosebud Indian Reservation in South Dakota, and Jonathan's Place in Dallas.

American Friends of the Episcopal Diocese of Jerusalem supports 13 schools, two major hospitals and clinics, 29 parishes, and 4 institutes for the disabled in a 5 country region of the Middle East regardless of ethnic or religious background.

Rosebud Sioux Indian Reservation in South Dakota is home to 21,250 members of the Lakota or Teton Sioux. Mission trips from Saint Michael engage in restoration projects and educational programs for young people including Vacation Bible School for the children and sports opportunities for the youth.

Jonathan's Place in Dallas provides a "home-style" emergency shelter for abused, abandoned and neglected children, a Foster & Adoptive Family Program, and a Girls Treatment Program. The Heart of Giving raised an additional \$32,945 which supports six Mission and Outreach programs locally, nationally, and in Central and South America.


Saint Michael Needy Family Fund is administered by the clergy provides non-judgmental financial help to parishioners and non-parshioners in need.

Jubilee Park is a 62-block neighborhood in the Fair Park area of Dallas which is being transformed from one of the lowest income, highest crime areas of the city into a vibrant community with hope and pride.

New Orleans Project/Hurricane Relief: For three years Saint Michael has provided strong backs, money, and hope to Gulf coast communities in Texas, Louisiana, and Mississippi devastated by recent hurricanes.

Honduras Mission Project has provided medical, educational, and developmental ministries to rural Honduras towns, and will initiate micro-lending programs to impact local economic development.

Amistad Mission in Bolivia ministers to nearly 100 orphans and Quechua natives with medical care, education, and spiritual development programs.

New Housing In Jubilee Park



Saint Michael Leadership Spearheading Jubilee Park Project To Build 40 New Affordable Homes

The Jubilee Park Community, with leadership from several Saint Michael parishioners, has launched an Affordable Housing program in conjunction with the City of Dallas. The plan calls for building up to 20 new homes in the next 18 months, and an additional 20 homes by 2017.

The new houses will be approximately 1,300 square feet,



The new affordable homes in Jubilee Park will have 3 bedrooms and about 1,300 square feet.

with three bedrooms and 2 ½ baths. Initial lot development has started on the first two homes which will be built on Garland Avenue about three blocks from the Jubilee Park Community Center. These two homes were made possible by the donation by Saint Michael of last year's offerings at Easter services. The additional homes, including Senior Housing, will be built on Ann Avenue, Congo Street and near the O.M. Roberts Elementary School.

Jubilee Park and Community Center Chief Executive Officer Ben Leal said the planning, development, and legal expertise from several Saint Michael parishioners brought the project to fruition. They include Ellis Skinner, chair of the Construction Task Force, Bob Axley and Tom Harbison, chairs of the Housing Task Force, and Jim Skochdopole, a Board member and counsel for Jubilee, who handled the legal issues. Several other Saint Michael members are serving on other project committees.



Gurley Place is a new 24 unit apartment complex for seniors.

The program calls for Jubilee Park to raise \$1 million, which will be matched by the City of Dallas. The money will be used to provide equity that will enable renters to buy a quality home in Jubilee for close to the same as rental payments. Jubilee Park has already raised over \$100,000, Leal said.

To celebrate its 50th anniversary in 1998, Saint Michael and All Angels Church initiated a project to revitalize Jubilee Park area, one of the most underserved areas in Dallas. Since then the community has seen the construction of the new O.M. Roberts Elementary School, a Community Center, Resource Center, The Teen Place, Davids' Place – a Head Start facility, Jeanie's Place – a new \$2 million school for children from pre-natal to 3 years old, and Gurley Place a 24 unit apartment complex for seniors.

"Jubilee Park and Community Center began with transforming 62 blocks of rambling streets into a cohesive unit," Leal said. "It has given residents a sense of place, ownership, and hope for the future." Dallas Police Chief David Brown called Jubilee "one of the best models of how to turn a failed neighborhood around. They got it right; it took a lot of work."

gotten all of the cancer? I said, Yes. 'Then why are you still going to a cancer support meeting, she said? Your surgery was over a year ago, it's time to 'let sleeping dogs lie.' My simple reply was, "like the MasterCard commercial, for me, my cancer support group is PRICELESS!"

Fact: Our group is an ecumenical group of women and meets the needs of all kinds of cancer.



Kathy Davis: "Soon after moving to Dallas, I was stunned with a diagnosis of breast cancer. 'Why now, I thought, when I am no longer surrounded by old friends and a long-time support system?' However, the Rector and the Pastoral Care Priest at Saint Michael welcomed me into the

fellowship of Saint Michael and introduced me to the Women in the Cancer Support Group, who live the faith, and provide energy and support for one another." "Some of my new sisters are at the beginning of their journey, while others have traveled it for many years. It's been a great place to get information, referrals, feedback, and a feeling of safety from people who have been there and done that. I belong, and am comforted by the fact that I am surrounded by a new long-term support system."

Fact: A licensed professional counselor meets with the group weekly.



Myra Lancaster: "On Thursday, June 10, 2010, I was informed that I had breast cancer. There was no doubt that I would attend the cancer support group at Saint Michael because my sister, Charlie Stobaugh, has been its leader for years. I went the next Monday scared to death and still in shock!

I was welcomed by the most amazing ladies who had all been in my shoes. They held my hand, listened to my fears, advised me, allowed me to cry, and prayed with me, every step of my journey. I don't know what I would have done without their encouragement, support and love and will be forever grateful to them.



From their first articulation of the faith, early Christians spoke of the Incarnation as the whole person. Christ embodied all of the goodness, character, justice and mercy of God. In Christ, they taught, we are the Body of God. Thus, the Incarnation is less a doctrine of the head than a practice of our lives, which Jesus did not come to do once and for all but to show any who were willing how God's word might become flesh in their own lives too.

"Follow me, and I will make you fish for people."... "Give to everyone who asks from you."... "In everything do to others as you would have them do to you." In sayings like these, Jesus gave his followers teachings they could embody. He taught them to see God in the world the same way he did -- in the way creation worked, in the way people acted.

To practice incarnation is to discover a pedagogy that is as old as the Gospels, as old as St. Francis caring for the animals, as old as Sister Clair caring for the poor, and as fresh as one of our preschool children being kind to a child left out, or one of our business executives running her business with high morals and fair pay, or one of our seniors gathering up hundreds of canned goods in the lanai and delivering them to the North Dallas Shared Ministry.

How are we shaped into goodness? Robert Coles once said, "Three things in human life are important. The first is to be kind. The second is to be kind. And the third is to be kind." As always, the New Testament goes deeper and more specific: "Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayer, contribute to the needs of others; extend hospitality to strangers... Bless those who persecute you ... Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another ... associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all" (Romans 12:9-18).

To embrace the daily practice of incarnation is to walk the way of life that God opened to us in the birth of Jesus of Nazareth, by showing us how to inhabit our daily opportunities, gifts, and resources as fully and faithfully as he did.

That's our mission. That's Epiphany. Join us in the journey.
