Annual Parish Meeting



Rector Cites Accomplishments in 2013 and Sets Goals for 2014

In his report to the congregation during the Annual Parish Meeting, The Rev. Dr. Bob Dannals listed several major projects and programs Saint Michael and All Angels undertook during the past year. His list included:

- Completion of the new Columbarium and south lawn project
- Installation of the new Preschool Playground
- Stabilize and grow our finances and pledging
- Reconsider the purpose and direction of the Saint Michael Foundation
- Build community and participation within the parish
- Explore new ways to provide Christian Formation and Worship

• Strategic planning for the best use of the church campus. He concluded his summation saying, "We have completed or made tremendous progress on all of these fronts."



The Rector noted that work will continue this spring in areas of Christian Formation and innovative worship alternatives. "By early summer," he said, "we hope to be publishing all this planning for the congregation and continue/begin these many initiatives in the fall." Dr. Dannals commended the project underway to eliminate the debt on the Lomo Alto office building. "When we own that building outright, we will realize roughly \$300,000 in extra income for church ministries..." he said. He also noted that detailed planning continued on a "range of facility issues, including formal discussions with the Episcopal School of Dallas regarding the length and provisions of their presence on our campus." Dr. Dannals told the parish, "I thank God for making us into a community of faith and action. Time and time again the Holy Spirit has enabled us to forge through a challenge, reach beyond the usual boundaries of the organization that passes as "church" and enable us to be comprehensive, diverse, welcoming, inclusive, and mission and outreach oriented."

Church Finances In Good Shape, Stronger Pledging Needed




Treasurer Matt Waller told the parish that the church's finances are in good shape, but that we need more pledges to meet the growing demands for Church programs and services.

"Our operating revenue came in at \$5,497,866," he said, which was \$94,134

less than budget primarily due to a shortfall in pledge payments of \$128,028. Waller said the clergy and staff managed their expenses \$167,711 below expectations, creating a \$76,711 surplus at the end of the year.

"We ended up with black ink, not because of additional pledges but rather due to careful expense management," Waller said. "Of course, we would prefer that our surplus comes from ample pledges to insure our programs are fully funded."




As of January 31st, the pledges for 2014 increased 4.8% and the number of pledges was up about the same rate, according to Waller. The average pledge year-over-year was basically flat. He noted that Saint Michael is continuing to get pledges for 2014 and that the final revenues are expected to grow.

The 2014 budget approved by the Vestry anticipates revenues of just over \$5 million, an increase of 4.3% over last year. After expenses, the church expects a modest \$6,000 surplus at the end of the year. Highlights from the budget include:

- A small compensation increase for clergy and staff
- An increase of \$15,000 to \$160,000 in Mission and Outreach grants
- An increase in most ministry budgets to support expanded programs
- · Budgeted only for critical maintenance expenses

Saint Michael Foundation Broadens Giving Opportunities - New Trustees Elected

The Saint Michael Foundation, with approval of the Vestry, has broadened the ways parishioners can support the programs of the church.

At the Annual Parish Meeting, out-going Foundation president, Giffen Weinmann said the Foundation will create a new Operations Endowment fund that will generate income to be used specifically to support the operating budget of the Church, so long as such support does not exceed 20% of operating revenue.

"This new fund is intended to provide a giving opportunity for those who wish to donate funds that will contribute to the operating budget in perpetuity," said Tricia Barnett Monfrey, the Foundation's Vice President of Development. "With the new, more expanded options available for giving the Foundation now has the means to meet the wishes of all parish members." she said.

The event's c o - c h a i r s , Bridget Miller and Monece Appleton, said the objective was to improve the educational t e c h n o l o g y provided to our teachers and

children, which includes providing Apple Computers for the classrooms and teachers, as well as Mimio Boards, HDMI-compatible projectors, program Apps, and other enhancements.

The auction gave parents the chance to purchase pictures of their child "in action" at the preschool, tables, chairs, and furniture decorated by parents, students, and artists, restaurant dinners, and other enticing items.



Women of Saint Michael Gifts Committee Gets to Work

More than 40 ladies from the Gifts Committee of the Women of Saint Michael got to work in February deciding how to distribute \$500,000 to area charitable organizations. The group has received 144 applications from charities seeking funds.

The Gifts Committee broke into four groups, Education, Health, Poverty, Protective/Episcopal, to review and study each application. Before completing the task, each qualifying charity will have personal interviews and visits by the committee members.



The one-half million dollars the Women of Saint Michael will distribute comes primarily from the St. Michael's Woman's Exchange in Highland Park Village and the 2013 Parish Party. Grant recipients will be announced at the Annual Spring Luncheon which will be held on April 22. The speaker at this year's luncheon is Jan Langbein, CEO of Shelter Ministries of Dallas, which oversees Genesis Women's Shelter and Austin Street Center .

Women of Saint Michael to be Honored by the Wilkinson Center

The Wilkinson Center, a poverty rescue and prevention agency for the working poor, will honor the Women of Saint Michael at its annual "Can Do" Luncheon in May. In making the announcement the organization cited the St. Michael's Woman's Exchange in the Highland Park Village which is run by church volunteers and donates its proceeds to charities. The Wilkinson Center said that this year's honorees are "people and organizations that work quietly for the betterment of the community."

Stained Glass Doors Installed in Church

Installation of the new Stained Glass doors in the church was completed Tuesday, February 18. The doors, designed by parishioner Bart Forbes, complete the Columbarium construction and Nave Courtyard project on the south lawn, which were dedicated in ceremonies last November.

Workmen from the Stanton Glass Studio in Waco installed the stained glass panels in one day. This is the same company that created the Bart Forbes-designed Angel Doors in the Saint Michael Chapel.

The columbarium and courtyard project includes 860 niches, a green interment area for the spreading of ashes, and a Memorial Wall for name-only remembrances. It also provided for refurbishing the existing columbarium.








Daily Devotions Available During Lent


Lenten Artist's Workshop Beginning March 19, 6:00 – 7:30

Stephen Ministry: Compassion in Action

The Stephen Ministry is a Pastoral Care Ministry of Saint Michael that offers sympathetic listening to our parishioners.

Often, one feels life is unbearable and we need to lean on someone else... we just need to get our troubles off our chests. The Stephen Ministry is this kind of listening ear. It is headed by Lay Leader, Jean Coleman and The Rev. Lisa Flores.

There are eight trained Leaders and and fourteen active Stephen Ministers. All have been through extensive training (50 hours) and continuing education. They have been commissioned by the clergy, taken an oath of confidentiality, and follow established guidelines of the Ministry.

The Stephen Ministry is best described as a caring Christian ministry of support for people in a time of crisis, such as the death of a spouse, a financial set-back, job crisis, divorce, etc. Stephen Ministers do not function as counselors. They function as compassionate listeners who walk through a person's time of crisis as a non-judgmental companion. The Stephen Minister is not a fixer.

Their Walk Together Is A Process:

Step 1) The person experiencing a crisis may meet with a member of the clergy to discuss their concerns. The priest may suggest using a Stephen Minister and upon agreement will refer the individual to the Lay Leader of the Stephen Ministry, Jean Coleman, who contacts the individual to determine if a Stephen Minister could help.

Step 2) Jean Coleman interviews the parishioner, in person, and reviews the request with The Rev. Lisa Flores.

Step 3) Together they decide whether to assign a Stephen Minister.

Step 4) Jean Coleman, using her extensive training reviews the available Stephen Ministers to find an appropriate match. NOTE: male Stephen Ministers are assigned to male care receivers and female Stephen Ministers are assigned to female care receivers. Jean, along with Lisa Flores, meets with the Stephen Minister who must agree to take on the assignment – all without knowing who the care receiver is to be.

Step 5) Once confirmed and the Stephen Minister contacts the care receiver. The two meet usually for about one hour, once a week.

Another step: The Stephen Minister reports to a Supervisory Group made up of other Stephen Ministers and leaders. Through a supervisory group, in a very structured and confidential way, each Stephen Minister receives support and input without ever divulging the care receiver's identity.

If you or someone you care about could use a Stephen Minister, urge him or her to contact a member of the clergy and start this process of healing with the knowledge that all is confidential.

Beginning March 1 and through the end of May, 2014, The Stephen Ministry will be accepting applications for those who feel called to serve in this compassionate and caring ministry. The 50 hours of training for new Stephen Ministers is scheduled to begin September 12 and run through November 24. Applications may be obtained by contacting Jean Coleman, jwcoleman@sbcglobal.net.

It's during the season of Lent that we are well-reminded of the real purpose in life and that following Christ is much better than chasing after self-absorption. It is during Lent that we are reminded of God's self-offering love, that it's better to give than to receive. We are brought to mind of our finite nature, and that each of us has a whole set of foibles, sins, and mistakes for which we can seek pardon and restoration. And we are reminded that a growing number of people in this country have simple homes (or none at all) not palaces, sparse supper tables not banquet dining tables, furnishings that come from second-hand stores rather than from dowries. If we can hear this Lent the voice of Mr. Lincoln's "better angels," we can step away from the clutter of our own hearts and the stuff around us, and take a journey of introspection, rediscovery, renewal and resolve.

The theme for this season at Saint Michael and All Angels is "compassion" -- to have "passionate mercy for and with others." If we truly take on a new found level of compassion for the people for whom Christ died, then our sackcloth and ashes of the season can issue forth in breaking out the best wine and shouting "alleluia" come Easter. If this journey is to have sticking power, it won't be a temporary journey for forty days, but will become a life-pattern, a life-long spiritual discipline of offering Christ's compassion each and every day.

I invite you to take some time each week for prayer, reflection, study, and service. At Saint Michael we're beginning our journey with one of the most stirring speakers and teachers in our church, The Very Rev. Dr. Alan Jones, Dean Emeritus of Grace Cathedral, San Francisco, who is preaching on Sunday, March 2 at 9:00 and 11:00 in the Church, and teaching in a combined adult class at 10:00 in Parish Hall.

During that next week, we hope to see you at the Shrove Tuesday Pancake supper on March 4, beginning at 5:00, and then the whole community will gather at one of the five services on Ash Wednesday, March 5. On the first Saturday in Lent, March 8, we will offer a quiet retreat with Br. David Vryhof of the Society of Saint John the Evangelist, 9:00 to 12-Noon in the Coke Activities Room. Each Wednesday in Lent, our superlative guest preachers will speak on the theme of "Compassion" during Evensongs at 6:30 in the Church beginning on March 12, and we hope you'll participate in the Stations of the Cross on Fridays in the Church at 6:00 p.m. Toward the end of the month, our music ministry is sponsoring "Saint Michael Presents" -- the spring concert featuring the Texas Boys' Choir on Sunday night, March 30, at 7:00 in the Church, and "Godspell" will be presented by our youth the same day, at 10:00 in the Parish Hall.

Have a holy and compassionate Lent, my friends.
