In one of the compelling stories in the Gospels, Jesus bids Peter and the other fishermen to launch out into the deep waters of the Sea of Galilee and drop their nets. Peter is reluctant at first, stating that they had fished all night and had caught nothing. He does as Jesus instructs and the haul of fish is so great it requires two boats to bring in the magnificent catch.



The biblical image of our call to be “fishers of people” and the ministry model of working the nets (networking), usually means standing safely on the shoreline and casting in the shallow waters. However, from time to time we are called by God to launch out into deeper waters, to work wider nets for a bigger catch. Often it requires larger vision, savvy planning, hard work, robust initiative, careful coordination, some risk-taking, and consistent prayer. This networking can only be carried out when we put aside narrow personal opinion and place our operative trust in the benefit of the whole community.

Two exciting and current efforts fit this deeper water launch at Saint Michael's: The Columbarium/South Lawn development and the new Saint Michael's Farmers Market. While the Columbaria effort is an addition to our existing ministry of “cemetery options” in the churchyard, the Farmers Market is a launch into the unknown – it's a faith-leap into an exciting neighborhood offering of community-building and outreach. Both efforts, using our special location, promise to provide a positive effect of friend-raising, stewardship of resources, and using our church campus and yards to their God-given potential.

Please read the exciting articles about both projects inside this edition of the Archangel. I extend my heartfelt thanks to many volunteers who are making these efforts a reality and many generous donors who have made significant contributions.

The challenges of this networking have not always been easy, and how these ministry efforts mature is not yet clear. If the way forward were always clear, little risk and faith would be required. But it is clear to me that God's compelling Spirit, the same Spirit that was present on the Day of Pentecost, is filling our sails as we launch into deeper waters. Thanks be to God!

The Courtyard Columbarium

From ancient times, Christians have considered places of burial to be sacred sites where the departed are remembered and honored. They are places for quiet remembrance, for prayer, for families and loved ones to gather. They are places of peace.

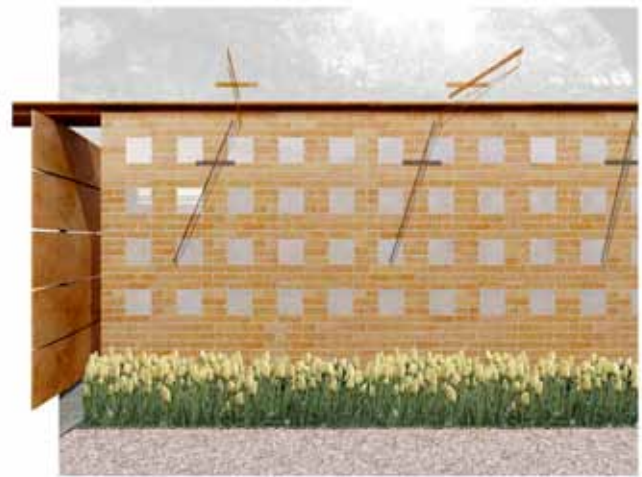


At Saint Michael and All Angels, the original Narthex Columbarium and the Chapel Columbarium are such places. And now, the Courtyard Columbarium, being developed near the south Narthex church entrance and the Bishop Moore Chapel, will carry on the sacred traditions of Christian burial to meet the needs of our parish.

In the Courtyard Columbarium, elements of God's creation are blended to create spaces of beauty and serenity, each contributing to an environment appealing to families and children and comforting the bereaved. A bronze Cross, turning gently with the breeze, connects our earthly existence with the heavens. Blue sky and clouds reflect into the site

through specially designed mirrored niches. Rain, collected in a bronze vessel, provides water for bud vases placed on the niches' marble plaques.

Pivoting stained glass doors installed in the south wall of the church provide direct access to the Courtyard Columbarium's 860 new niches, as well as the green interment area for spreading of ashes, and the Memorial Wall for name-only remembrances. In the midst is a landscaped Nave Court providing a convenient and serene venue for a committal service or other outdoor worship.



The Courtyard Columbarium, scheduled to be completed early next year, will include renovating the south entrance to the church, and incorporating the existing Narthex Columbarium into the overall columbaria project.



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THE SAINT MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS COURTYARD COLUMBARIUM

Columbarium niches are initially available at two price levels:

- \$5,000 for a double
- \$3,000 for a single

The price includes an urn and memorial plaque engraved and mounted on the niche.

Green Interment is available for those wishing their remains to be buried or scattered.

- \$1,000 includes an engraved plaque mounted on the Memorial Wall.

Memorial Wall spaces are available for those whose remains rest elsewhere.

- \$500 which includes an engraved memorial plaque mounted on the Memorial Wall.

Inurnment in the Columbarium is reserved for past or present communicants of Saint Michael and All Angels Church and members of their immediate families (spouses, parents, children, grandparents, grandchildren). Inurnment of others may be permitted by approval of the Columbarium Committee and the Vestry.

There are several ways of securing a space in the Columbarium:

- A one-time payment of the full amount
- Installments agreed upon between the Applicant and Saint Michael and All Angels Church

Saint Michael's Farmers Market to Open June 30th

On Saturday, June 30th Saint Michael's north parking lot will be turned into a bustling Farmers Market with homegrown vegetables, produce, fruits, and other specialty foods. The Farmers Market will be open from 8:00 to 12-Noon every Saturday through the fall months.

"We expect to begin with between 14 and 20 different vendors when we open and grow from there," says Nancy Powers, Director of Saint Michael's Market. "We welcome farmers and growers who practice natural, sustainable, organic practices and whose products come from within 150 miles of Dallas County. We also will have specialty foods, including baked goods, tamales, herbs, cheeses, eggs, honey, milk, meats, and pasta," Ms. Powers said. Distributors will not be permitted to sell at the market.

The idea to create the Saint Michael's Farmers Market came from several parishioners who had been involved with farmers markets in their past and who were looking for new ways expand the

church's reach into the community. A committee led by Guy Griffeth turned the idea into reality. "We want the community to know that there are other ways to be a church beyond the traditional Sunday worship services," said Dr. Bob Dannals, Saint Michael's Rector. "As we encourage environmental stewardship and promote healthy homegrown food products, we expect the Farmers Market to be a gathering place for our neighbors on Saturday mornings."

Ms. Powers said vendors have shown a lot of interest and enthusiasm for the Saint Michael's Farmers Market. They like the location and the services provided. "What a great way to kickoff the July 4th holiday weekend," she stated.

Before joining the Saint Michael's Farmers Market, Ms. Powers served as executive director of the Highland Park Alumni Association, The Elisa Project, and currently serves as State Administrator for Texas High School Boys Lacrosse.

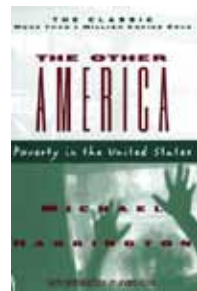

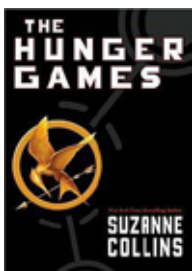

The Women of Saint Michael celebrated one of the group's most successful years at its Annual Spring Luncheon, announcing that it had raised more than \$500,000 to support Dallas area charities.

The luncheon, held May 4th, featured Susan Haltom, author of *One Writer's Garden*, who entertained the women with stories of Pulitzer Prize winner Endora Welty and her fabulous family gardens in Jackson, Mississippi.

Ginger Sager, President of the WOSM, praised the members for their dedication and service during the year noting the group's many accomplishments including achieving new heights at the St. Michael Woman's Exchange in Highland Park Village, an "over-the-top" party for the parish, fun and stimulating programs, and setting new records in supporting Mission and Outreach.

Gifts Committee chair Kathy Kelley told the gathering, "We take this mission very seriously. The committee spent nine weeks reviewing the requests and we approved 89 agencies for funding, the highest amount ever, a total of \$503,100."

During the meeting, Mrs. Sager turned over the leadership of the Women of Saint Michael to the new President, Elizabeth Gambrell, who promised another exciting productive year for the group.

Touch Base Phone Ministry

Touch Base Telephone Ministry is a place to “Get Plugged In”!

Lewis Duncan is plugged in. He volunteers for the Saint Michael Pastoral Care Ministry as the primary caller for Touch Base Phone Ministry.

Lewis and his partner, Jeffrey Marshall, have been active at Saint Michael since moving to Dallas several years ago. However, an illness caused Jeffrey to be confined to a wheelchair. Not to be deterred, they both volunteered to answer phones at the Saint Michael reception desk when needed. Then in 2008, Jeffrey had an accident which confined him to their home and curtailed their opportunity to participate in worship services at Saint Michael.



Since that time Lewis has become the full time caregiver for Jeffrey, but this didn't stop his need to 'belong' to the church community and a desire to volunteer. Lewis saw a notice on a church bulletin board citing a need for a volunteer to make phone calls for our Pastoral Care Ministry. Thus was born the Touch Base Phone Ministry, with Lewis as the initial caller. Lewis has been making telephone visits to Saint Michael's homebound parishioners and those who have had a death in their family for the past 5 years. Last year he talked with more than 200 parishioners.

Ask Lewis how difficult it is to make the calls and what skills or gifts are needed and he replies, "Skills?... just the ability to make a phone call and care about the person on the other end. I also make calls to the recently bereaved to let them know that Saint Michael's has them in our prayers and to see how we can help. I was a hesitant about making the calls at first, but soon discovered that the parishioners were very grateful for our concern".

"Jeffrey and I are not as visible as we once were," he says, "but this ministry gives me a sense of purpose and belonging. I make the calls at a regular time and date each month to check up on my new friends. We don't talk long, but enough to say, 'Hello, we at Saint Michael are thinking about you.' I've learned about family gatherings, children and grandchildren and include them in my prayers. I'm not sure who enjoys these calls most, the recipient, or me. This ministry has had a positive influence on my life."

The Touch Base Telephone Ministry, urges you to participate as a volunteer caller, or by letting us know about parishioners who would appreciate hearing a friendly voice. New Elementary School Gets Started in Jubilee Park Area
