The New Testament makes amply clear, inviting people to give money became necessary once the Christian church began to exist in the world. Paul took pride at first in earning his own way, but when his missionary work grew he accepted the church's support. The first Christians worshipped in homes and public places, but as numbers grew wealthy patrons gave homes or had church buildings erected. Eventually whole communities pooled resources to build, to care for those in need and to further the spread of the Gospel.



In both the Old and New Testaments there is an underlying basis for living and giving. The Big Giver is the Creator and the Redeemer. In strictest terms we creatures neither make, own, nor earn anything. All is gift! Thus, it is absolutely basic to our spiritual growth to give – to give of self and money in an answering love, as a tangible worship of God and the building up of God's people. In Hebrew teaching, this was a tithe, literally ten percent. In the New Testament, Jesus and his followers strongly maintain substantive giving of money as a central aspect of ministry, of discipleship. Jesus often used the valuable terms "being sacrificial" and "being faithful stewards."

The stewardship questions ask us to decide what we will do with what we have been given. Whether we choose to be generous and thankful or guarded and cautious, whether we live out of a basis of fear and scarcity or from a place of joy and abundance, we are still caring for our resources of time, talent and treasure.

Stewardship season (which is actually all through the year) is upon us at Saint Michael and All Angels. The theme is "Here I am, Lord," from the familiar renewal song – based on a passage from Genesis. Our parish is committed to providing opportunities, events, moments, touches whereby each of us might say, "Here I am, Lord, send me." We are dedicated to spreading the Good News of Jesus Christ and to serving God.

Our appeal this fall is straight and simple; it is focused on money because money is a potent symbol and an effective instrument for doing God's work in the world. The appeal is: if you are not a pledger/giver, we ask you to become one – believing it is good for the soul and helps provide for the ministries which are ours in this parish. If you are a pledger/giver, we ask you to move closer to (or past) the tithe. If you presently give, say, 2%, we invite you to increase to 4%; if you are presently giving 4%, we ask you to press yourself to 6%, etc. As I mentioned last month, Valerie and I decided many years ago to be tithers and we've joyfully never looked back. In truth, it feels good to give generously for the right reasons – for the sake of the Gospel.

The needs we see are great and we have freely given away the gifts that God has bestowed on us. Your pledge, your generous giving will help us continue to grow and serve.

This comes with my sincerest trust and thanks.

Why do I give?



Joseph Cahoon has been a parishioner of Saint Michael since 2005. He is a Lecturer and the Managing Director of the Real Estate Finance and Investment Center at the University of Texas McCombs School of Business. He and his wife, Christie, are the proud parents of Claire (9), John (7) and Anne (6).

As a child, I was taught that adults should tithe 10% of their income to the church. When I ostensibly became an adult, I began to wonder about this rule. Was it based on pre-tax or after-tax income? Was it inclusive or exclusive of other charitable giving? Where did time and talents factor into the equation? I was scared of not being able to provide for myself and eventually for my family. I did give, but I did so cautiously and conservatively.

Then one day I heard the message, “give what you felt led by God to give.” This perspective was comforting because I rationalized that God wouldn’t want me to be anxious about giving. However, I would be the first to admit that my decision to give, while prayerful, didn’t always feel led, but often calculated.

My attitude towards giving changed again a few years ago when I heard the message, “give until it hurts.” Whether times were good or bad financially, I felt that as long as I pushed myself to be uncomfortable about how much I gave, no matter the amount, then I was doing my part and honoring God. My giving increased, but my anxiousness about giving didn’t disappear.

That brings me to my latest revelation about giving. In preparation for writing these words, I sought the council of one of my best friends. He said something that was so simple, yet so profound in light of my own journey. He said, “we should give to feel joy. In giving to our church-community and to others, we can experience the joy of God’s gifts to us.”

I realized that I had fallen short of this final step in my giving. I had pushed myself to increase my giving by accepting my fear of financial hardship, yet I still gave with an anxious heart. Through my friend, I discovered the missing step – embracing joy. As I thought about our conversation, I was struck by four simple words: Belief, Fear, Courage, and Joy. Think about those words in that specific order. We, as Christians, believe in the community of fellowship in Christ and the necessity of working to sustain and expand that community. However, faith in Christ and the mission of the church can be scary. We fear giving up control, of accepting Christ’s role as our shepherd. To overcome that fear requires a courage that is deep and often uncomfortable. Yes, the final step of faith is a leap, but I do believe it is a leap of Joy.

So, the question for me and for you is, are we ready to take that leap? Are we ready as a community to set aside our fear and find joy? Are we ready to help our church thrive and expand beyond its walls to share God’s joy with others? Each

DR. PHILIP JENKINS LEADS DISTINGUISHED LECTURE SERIES OCTOBER 14

Presentations Scheduled on Sundays to Increase Availability



Dr. Philip Jenkins will headline the first Distinguished Lecture of the Fall at Saint Michael. He will address “Laying Down the Sword: Why we can’t ignore the Bible’s violent verses” at a combined adult Sunday School hour at 10:00 in the Theater.

At 12:30 he will engage interested parishioners in a dialogue on the subject at a reservations only luncheon in the Coke Activities Room.

Dr. Jenkins, described by the Economist Magazine as “one of America’s best scholars of religion,” is a Distinguished Senior Fellow at Baylor University’s Institute for Studies of Religion and co-directs the Institute’s Initiative on Historical Studies of Religion. He also serves as the Edwin Erle Sparks Professor of Humanities Emeritus at Pennsylvania State University.

Major interests of Dr. Jenkins include the study of global Christianity; of new and emerging religious movements; and of twentieth century U.S. history. He has published more than 20 books which have been translated into 10 languages.

Every two seconds, someone in this country needs blood! Since 2009, Saint Michael has partnered with the American Red Cross to help provide the blood supply for those in need.

The American Red Cross provides emotional support to victims of disasters around the world and in our community. The Red Cross is the number one supplier of blood to our U.S. military (outside of the military themselves), and is the communication link between our service men and women and their families. When help is needed in our local neighborhoods due to fire or natural disasters, the American Red Cross is there to assist with the tragedy.

In the past 3 years, Saint Michael has held six blood drives and has helped a total of 609 people – people whose lives depend on platelets, plasma and red blood cells obtained from our congregation's generous donations.
